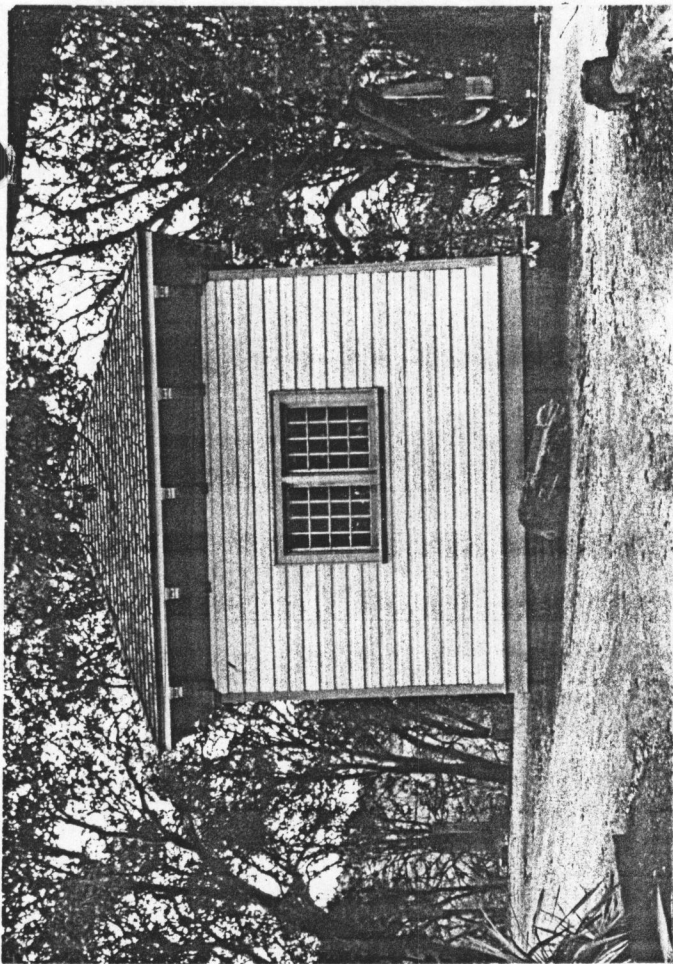

Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The Sexton's Tool House is the only structure in the Jacksonville Cemetery. Built in 1878 by John Hockenjos and George Holt, the Sexton's Tool House is a small square, wood frame structure. At present, it is painted in two shades of gray.

The exterior walls of this simple building are sheathed with channel drop siding and there are corner boards with pilaster caps. A single door containing four recessed panels is located on both the east and west walls. The south wall has paired, fixed light windows, each with sixteen small panes. The north wall is void of openings.

The building has a hip roof sheathed with wood shingles. The boxed cornice is supported by decorative scroll brackets that are joined to a wide frieze board that rakes under the eaves of the building. The structure rests on a sandstone and brick foundation.

The Sexton's Tool House stands near the heart of the Cemetery and is encircled not only by gravestones of all ages but a dense forest dominated by madrone trees.
