HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE

The house was originally owned by the postmaster general Tigard. It was constructed in Ca. 1904 and was moved from its original location on the property, closer to 92nd Street, further back on the lot. This move took place about 13 years ago according to Pat Christen, who now leases the property from the Dougalls. The house was expanded at this time by the addition of a kitchen, master bedroom and bath to the rear of the house. The Dougalls bought the property from the Scott family, who moved and remodeled the house.

Because we were unable to find the name of the original owner, the historical research on the house has been limited. Research has shown however, that it is one of the residences that survived the sudden growth of Tigard which occurred in the 1950's and 1960's. It is well constructed with building details which echo the Queen Anne Style popular in former years. The house is associated with the first postmaster of Tigard, an important member of the community. The building remains in excellent condition, a significant cultural resource to the City of Tigard.
