The Walden Store is a rectangular, wood frame building of one story which stands on Mosby Creek Road near Mosby Creek about a mile south of the creek's junction with Row River. The building, which was resited from a previous location about sixty years ago, has been doubled in size. Perhaps the addition was made in the 1920's. The rieft side of the building (east side when facing the structure) is the original section. It has its original flushboard interior. The exterior of the building is shingle. The gable roof is now composition shingles.

This building was served the logging-farming population of the Mosby Creek Valley for nearly seven decades. In 1902 George Hastings built a railroad spur to the hill behind the Walden Store to ship out logs to the Long and Bingham Sawmill in Cottage Grove. These holdings were bought out in 1906 by Brown Lumber Company. This site was named for a man named Walden who purchased the land from Bert Linbaugh. Walden later sold the location to Jim Linbaugh. The store is yet in use and serves the rural population of the Mosby Creek Valley. Lee Dug an was the longtime owner and operator of this store following World War II.

The old film "The Emperor of the North" was filmed in the Walden area. (over)

Chriss, who came from Idaho and bought a piece of ground from Jim Linbaugh of Walden in 1923 / residents in the area give an earlier date for the opening of the store. The ran the store for one year and sold to Nils Lewis of Divide. After Mr. Lewis' death his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Lee Dugan ran the store 'til Mr. Dugan's death, at which time Mrs. Dugan sold to Mr. and Mrs. Steve Kavitz who still run the store."
