7. Description

The Mack Canyon Site (35SH23) is on the right side of the Deschutes River,

Sherman County, Oregon. The site is characterized by a number of circular depressions which vary in size from 1.3 to 14 meters in diameter. The round depressions are on a terrace, approximately 1500 meters long, 75 meters wide, and from 7 to 12 meters above the water level of the river. An abandoned railroad bed runs along one edge of the site. The occupational area may extend under the fill for the railroad bed.

Immediately above the site, a weathered talus slope extends nearly to the canyon rim, 1800 to 2400 feet above. The adjacent parts of the Deschutes River Canyon have nearly vertical walls.

Sagebrush, interspersed by an occaisional juniper, is the most prominant vegetation in the area. Willows grow along the river. Grass and weeds occur sparsely throughout the area.

Aboriginally, the area was occupied by the Molalla until about A.D. 1750. From A.D. 1840-50, the site was within the tribal boundaries of the Tenino. Both of these tribes are Sahaptin speakers whose main subsistence base was fishing. Prehistorically, the site was occupied by Plateau and Riverine hunter-gatherers.

The site was excavated by the University of Oregon during the summers of 1965 to 1968 for the Bureau of Land Management.

8. Significance

The site was occupied from after 5000 B·C. until the early A.D. 1800's. The early date estimate comes from the finding of volcanic ash, perhaps related to the eruption of Mt. Mazama about 7,000 years ago, at the bottom of the earliest cultural strata. The late occupation date has been evidenced by the presence of white manufactured goods in the site.

Mountain sheep and river mussels were the primary resource used by the Mack Canyon Site's occupants. To a lesser extent, coyotes were also eaten. The lack of fish and rabbit remains at the site, normally abundant in the Sahaptin area sites, suggests that the site was occupied at a time of year, such as winter, when fish and rabbit were not readily available.

The extensiveness of the site, and its relatively great time depth make the Mack Canyon Site (35SH23) important scientifically, and eligible for nomination to the National Register.
