Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Henry Brown House, completed possibly as late as 1883, is a choice, if late example of the Classical Revival Style in domestic architecture in Oregon. Its floor plan is that of a New England farmhouse, undoubtedly based upon models in the builder's native New Hampshire. The house is presently unoccupied, but is used for storage purposes. Its general condition is sound, although the exterior has not been painted for some years. The current owner is planning to paint the exterior and repair the roof.

The Henry Brown House is located in Sec. 21, T.22S., R.8W., of the Willamette Meridian, in Douglas County, Oregon. The house is oriented to the south on a natural terrace below a ridge, and it overlooks the Umpqua River. The narrow valley setting is rural, characterized by grazing fields and scattered stands of timber.

The T-shaped building features a gable-roofed main block of 2-1/2 stories approximately 20 feet across the facade and 27 feet in depth. This section contains the front stairhall, parlor and bedrooms. The kitchen and keeping room section of the house is contained in a 20-foot-long, gable-roofed single story ell at the west side of the main block. This west wing is approximately 18 feet in depth.

A foundation of locally quarried sandstone, laid without mortar, supports the sills a foot and a half above grade. The structure is of rough-sawn wood produced locally. The exterior walls are covered with 6" horizontal weather boards. The roof is presently covered with composition shingles.

Eave returns are made up of a series of moldings which, with the cut-out basket arches decorating the entablatures of the south porches, enrich the simply-finished and restrained exterior. The south-facing porches of main block and ell and the general bulk of the facade are thought to recall New England building traditions. The main entrance, offset to one side of the main block facade, has sidelights and transom. Linteled window openings are fitted with six over six sash. The original louvered shutters are in storage. The house initially had two brick chimneys constructed of locally manufactured brick. The chimney in the main block was removed sometime between 1905 and 1940. There have been no major additions to the house other than a small utility room and bathroom in a lean-to off the rear of the kitchen ell. The latter addition is unseen from the front of the house. In 1940 a wood shed and carriage house which extended from the west end of the single story ell were removed.

Internally, the house has been little altered since the date of its construction. The single story ell containing the kitchen and keeping room is served by a brick fireplace with mantelpiece which acts as a backing for a cookstove. In this section plywood paneling has been applied to the walls, and acoustical tile now covers the ceiling. Above these rooms is an attic space accessible from the second floor of the main block. The 2-1/2-story section of the house contains on the first floor the parlor, entry stairhall, and two bedrooms. The first floor ceiling heights vary. The parlor and bedroom ceilings are 11 feet, whereas the kitchen and keeping room ceilings of the ell are 10 feet in height. The parlor fireplace is of sandstone cut in large blocks. Its wood mantelpiece is finely proportioned but simply detailed in the tradition of the Classical Revival.

The second floor of the main block contains four bedrooms having ceiling heights of about 9 feet. These bedrooms are arranged around the stairway. A large unfinished attic story is reached by an enclosed stair.

Interior walls throughout the house are rough-sawn horizontal boards covered with cheesecloth and wallpaper. Several rooms have only one layer of wallpaper, some of which appears to be roughly contemporary with the date of construction. Ceilings are finished with 5" boards, smoothly planed and painted white. The turned newell posts of the staircase have richly built up profiles. The railing of the straight stair is made up of turned balusters, and the bannister of the second floor is formed of square balusters.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The home built for Henry Brown on the north bank of the Umpqua River four miles west of the farming and lumber-milling community of Elkton between 1876 and 1883 is significant to Douglas County as an exceptionally well-preserved demonstration of the longevity of the Classical Revival building tradition in rural western Oregon. In a state where translations of building ideas from the Mid-Atlantic or Southern states are typical, the survival of a nearly pure New England type is noteworthy. (New England types once were more plentiful in the Umpqua Valley.) The quality of craftsmanship in the house is also significant. Henry Brown was important in local history as a prosperous livestock rancher and an influential Republican who was elected to the Oregon State Legislature in 1882.

Henry Brown came to Oregon from New Hampshire in 1852 to engage in the operation of pack trains between Scottsburg (head of navigation on the Umpqua) and the gold fields of southern Oregon. In 1856 he married Priscilla Stearns, the sister of his business partner. In the same year he bought the Henderer Donation Land Claim of 640 acres, and through a series of land sales he enlarged his holdings to 1,300 acres, which he used primarily for the raising of cattle. Brown was active in the Republican party and, in 1882, was elected to the State House of Representatives.

Built as a utilitarian farmhouse for a large family, Brown's residence had become too large for his descendents by the 1940s. However, the main block continued to be occupied until as recently as 1975. The house is used for storage of personal belongings of the owners, who are directly descended from Henry Brown. In recent years the owners built a new home 60 feet of more to the east of the historic farmhouse.

It is not known precisely when the Henry Brown House was built. The best documentary clue comes from a reference in A. G. Walling's local history brought out in 1884. The attributed date of 1883 is remarkably late in view of the style and certain construction features of the house and in view of Brown's acquisition of the farm property as early as the 1850s. Further, there was a sawmill operating in Elkton by the 1870s. The local Plaindealer reported in 1876 that Brown entertained 15 couples in his house at Christmastime.

Commencing at a point at the intersection of the centerline of the Umpqua Highway and the westerly margin of the Agee property access road extended, thence in a northerly direction along the westerly margin of said access road approximately 250', thence in a northeasterly direction in a line parallel with the Umpqua Highway approximately 125', thence in a southerly direction in a line parallel with the access road approximately 250' to the centerline of the Umpqua Highway, thence in a southwesterly direction along the centerline of the Umpqua Highway approximately 125' to the point of beginning; to include the Henry Brown House exclusively among major improvements (a non-historic shed falls within the nominated area), and containing in all 1.39 acres, more or less.




