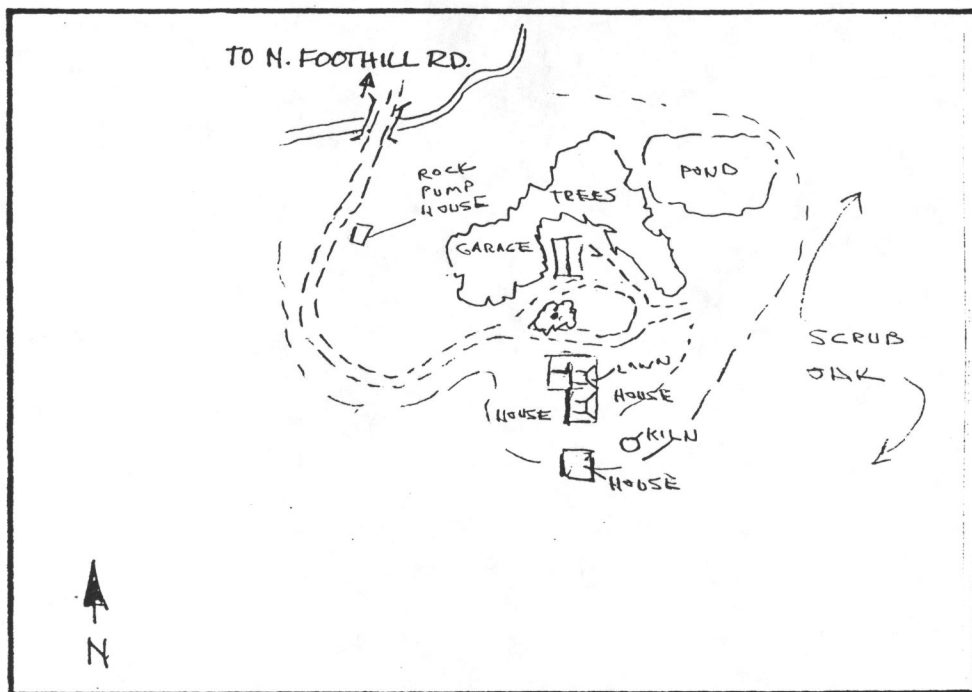

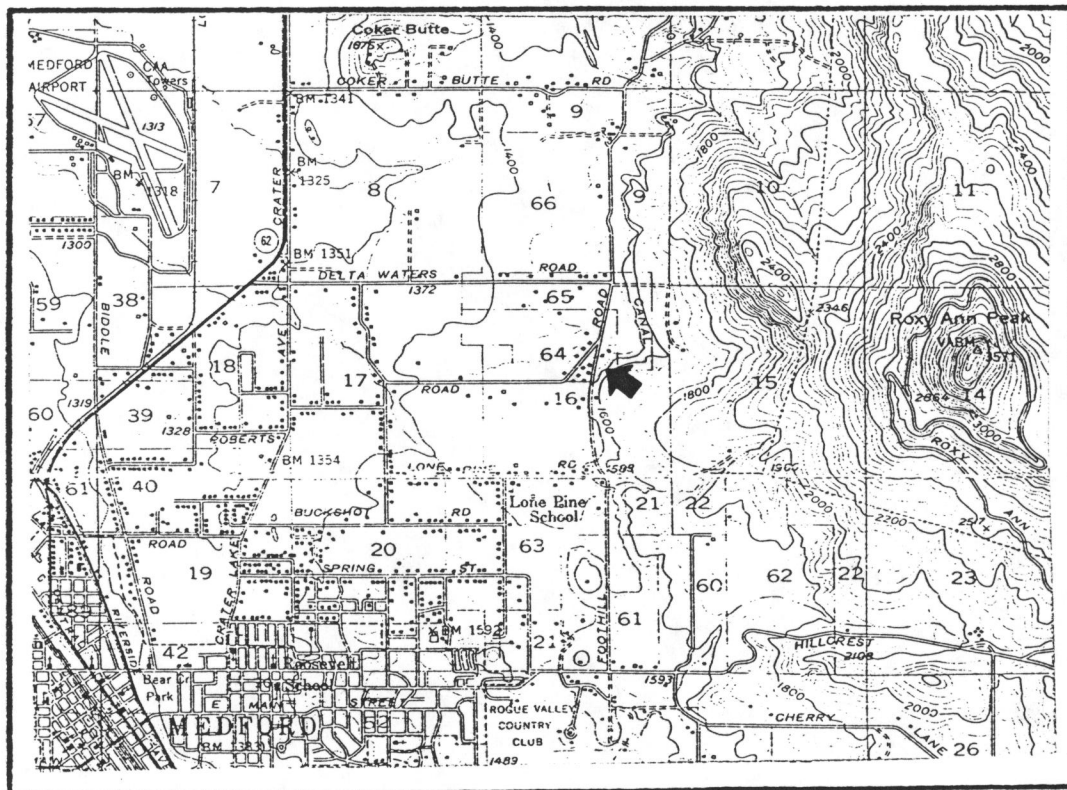

Physical description of property and statement of historical significance:

The H. Chandler Egan house is a large, two-story wood frame and masonry building displaying Craftsman and Bungalow design characteristics. This structure has an eccentric roof system using gable, jerkinhead, gambrel and shed elements. The building exterior is of clapboard and shingle siding and native stonework. The house has a variety of windows, double hung, casement, sliding and fixed. The house stands on a secluded knoll above North Foothill Road, three miles northeast of Medford. The building has an open, multi-level floorplan, an early 20th century innovation.

H. Chandler Egan, a 1905 Harvard graduate, arrived in the Rogue River Valley at the start of the orchard boom. He was involved in orcharding, business and social activities in the Valley. Twice U. S. Amateur Champion golfer in 1906 and 1908, he designed the present Rogue Valley Country Club golf course, and its forerunner in 1914. He was a founding member of the Rogue River Valley University Club in 1910. The Egan house may be from a design by early Medford architect, Frank C. Clark.
